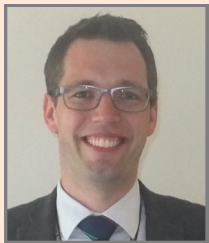




WASELEY NEWS

Success all round!



It has been an exceptional term at Waseley Hills and I hope you will agree that this collection of celebrations demonstrates the immense change and positive movement that is happening with the school and community this year.

We began the term with the official publication of the outcome of our Ofsted visit in December in which the HMI inspector reported that the school has taken "decisive and well-chosen actions to address the areas of improvement. There is an appropriate sense of urgency to the changes you are making. Staff are working well with you to implement these changes, and pupils are responding well too." One of the most pleasing parts of the day was hearing HMI Clarkson say "I am absolutely positive that this school is already very secure".

This report has already had significant consequences for the school. Recruitment has blossomed since and, so far, we have had the largest admissions into Year 7 in five years as people can see the progress being made. ►

Waseley Hills is part of Central Region Schools Trust



We have some tremendous news in our Sixth Form this term. A huge congratulations to our Sixth Formers around their university offers. Over 80% of our cohort have applied for university and 95% of them have gained an offer from their first choice destination. A third of these are from a Russell Group university including medicine and veterinary courses. A huge congratulations to them for all of their hard work during the application process.

January saw the start of the new build project. The half term break was utilised to start to build the compound and fence off the playground ready for phase one of the 8,493m² state-of-the-art facility, comprising two core blocks, which will replace the existing school and will cater to more than 1,000 pupils. Students have responded impeccably to the



changes this has brought to the school with a one-way system and shared use of the sports hall and studio at break and lunch. Tilbury Douglas have also delivered assemblies about the new build, inspiring the next generation of architects, builders and designers alike. They have plans to deliver similar assemblies in the feeder primary schools, with the Holywell one this term having gone down a storm.

This term has also seen two large external reviews to support our progress. The SEND department welcomed Lorraine Peterson (OBE) who scrutinised the provision for SEND students. Lorraine has visited all of the CRST schools and recognised Waseley as best

practice in many areas, an enormous achievement for Mrs Stokes our SENDCO and Miss Snell our MAB Lead alongside the phenomenal SEND department. A special mention must go to Mr Ravenhill, Mrs Miller and Mrs Joshi for their excellent work, particularly during the months before the summer break last year, to allow the school to continue their progress in SEND provision.

The Safeguarding and Pastoral team also had an external review with a specialist company for safeguarding in schools. They commented on how impressed they were with our students and the cohesiveness of the school. It was lovely to see the amazing safeguarding team who deal with the most difficult of cases, led by Mrs Meredith our Designated Safeguarding Lead, get this recognition and validation for their exceptional hard work and care.

Perhaps the most exciting part of the term for me has been the extraordinary amount of success our students have had. They have taken part in a vast number of extra-curricular competitions and activities many of which have been recognised as outstanding. There have been multiple wins in football fixtures for both boys and girls teams, handball wins and an excellent dance festival in PE. There have also been wins in Trust Science competitions and Psychology competitions for Sixth Form. The students were exceptional on the Austria ski trip and plans are already under way to run this again next year. The first musical in the school for 12 years was a roaring success and showed the community what the students can achieve so wonderfully. Our Year 7 students impressed Morgan Stanley in their project to engage in the world of business and finance and the DofE first training weekend was also a great success. These are just a few of the numerous moments that have seen our students flourish.

It may well have only been a 10-week term, but the students and staff made the most of every minute of it. Thank you for taking the time to read and share the experiences. I hope that you enjoy seeing how brilliant the students have been and the hard work put in by our great staff.

A trip back through time

The students conducted a self-guided tour through rock formations, fossils and the structure of the Earth, taking in a variety of fabulous minerals and gemstones, dinosaur skeletons and real animal skulls that showed the path of human evolution.



We concluded our visit by completing a selection of activities on the tectonic plates, continental drift theory, finding evidence for plate movements and looking at where on our planet volcanoes and earthquakes happen.

being used to teach students about life cycles and statistical testing.

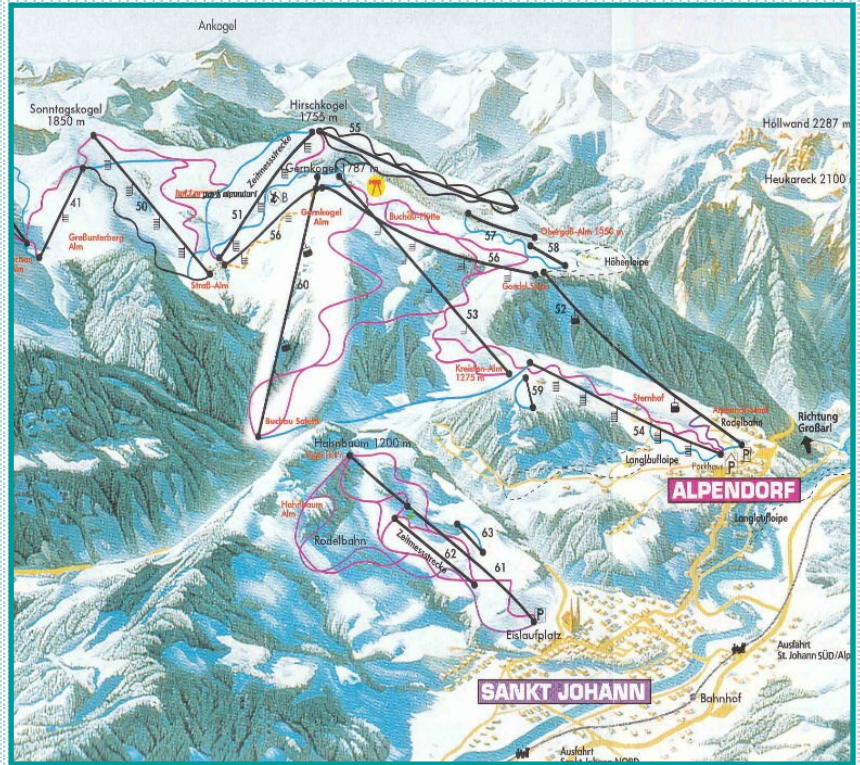
Students have really enjoyed handling the Waseley chicks as part of their science lessons. The chicks have enjoyed it too, with some even having a snooze in students' hands!

Waseley Sixth





Students have taken part in careers trips this term including an Apprenticeship festival at Millennium Point, Birmingham and a UCAS Discovery event at Worcester University.



Young Enterprise: Our Year 12 students have been working hard setting up their own company from scratch – Tails and Trinkets. They ran a fundraising bake sale to raise startup funds in readiness for launching their final product next term. They are learning vital skills for life beyond school ranging from marketing, finance and company operations.

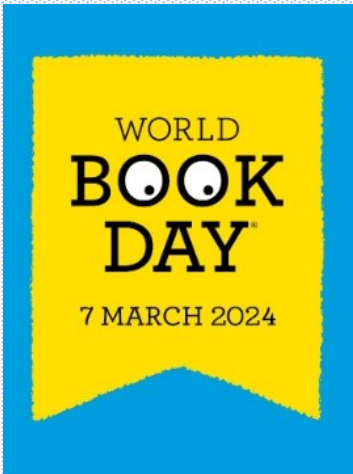
We are incredibly proud of everyone involved and cannot wait for the next show! Bring on next year!

- Have a conversation with a teacher about what they are reading.

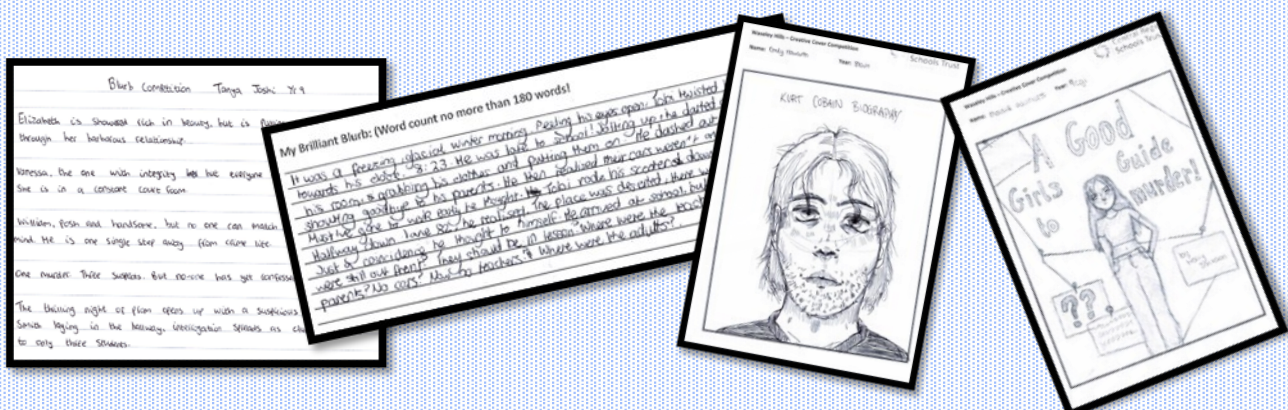
We tickled the students' curiosity with an extract from a story in every lesson with staff reading to their classes for 10 minutes in every

Students' impressive entries have been awarded Ethics points as well as a place on the Spanish display board.





Let's read about chocolate

The history of chocolate begins on what is now the southern part of Mexico and part of Central America, in a region known as Mesoamerica, since the cacao plant is native to this land. Pre-colombian cultures such as the Olmecs and the Mayans cultivated this plant and used the cacao seeds to prepare beverages, something similar to hot cocoa but with a bitter taste.

The Aztecs did something similar, but they apparently drank this beverage cold, instead of hot. The word 'chocolate' comes from a nahuatl word xocolātl (the X has a *ch* sound here) and it meant something like 'bitter drink' or 'bitter water'.

After the Spanish conquest of the Aztecs, chocolate was imported to Europe. There, it quickly became a court favourite. It was still served as a beverage, but the Spanish added sugar or honey to counteract the natural bitterness.



In 1847, Joseph Fry discovered a way to mix the ingredients of cocoa powder, sugar and cocoa to manufacture a paste with a higher percentage of cocoa butter that could then be more easily moulded into a solid chocolate bar. He is generally credited for the first mass-produced bar.

White chocolate is technically not considered 'real' chocolate, as it does not contain cocoa solids. However, it does contain cocoa butter, sugar and milk solids, which give it a creamy texture and sweet flavour. White chocolate was invented in the 1930s by Nestlé. The Swiss company developed this new type of chocolate in response to a surplus of cocoa butter. It was first launched in Europe under the name *Milky Bar*.

Knife Crime Assembly



On Monday 12th March, Years 7, 8 and 9 took part in an informative and interactive workshop around knife crime as part of their PSHE curriculum. Peter Martin, creator #droptheknife, led the session supporting pupils to be fully in the know about the dangers of carrying a knife but also teaching them about protective behaviour so they can keep safe within the community.

Although knife crime levels in West Mercia Police area are relatively low in comparison to other parts of the county, we need to educate children and young people from an early age to make sure they understand the message 'Save a life, Ditch the knife'. Police alone cannot tackle knife crime. It takes a multi-agency approach involving local authorities, schools, young people, parents/ families and voluntary organisations with everyone playing their part!

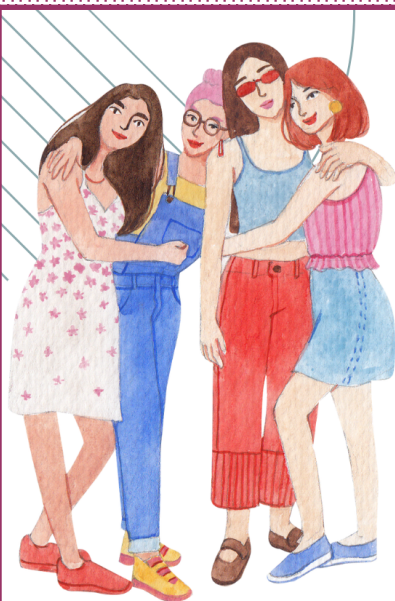
